CAPACITY BUILDING, STRATEGIES AND METHODOLOGIES FOR A EUROPEAN FEMINIST FOREIGN POLICY

This five day summer school is designed to introduce students, practitioners and other stakeholders to a complex range issues and trends underpinning the historical development of gender equality policies in Europe. This Summer School will introduce key debates and methodologies for understanding the role of gender in the context of European external affairs.

Focusing on the gendered nature of external affairs - including trade, foreign policy, security and defence - it provides participants with the competencies and strategic tools they need to carry out detailed analysis of the opportunities and constraints of feminist foreign policy as a mainstream approach. This innovative five day training course provides a range of tools and approaches to carry out gender analyses and impact assessments.

Drawing on the Centre for Research on the European Matrix's (CRonEM) world class research expertise on European politics, policies and law, the programme will adopt a multidisciplinary approach to the evaluation of the unintended gender consequences of foreign and security policies. Crucially, drawing on a range of innovating and experiential teaching methods, the course will merge theory and practice, thus providing a useful set of resources for the analysis of current trends in European politics and policies.
