Programmes with German at the University of Surrey

Studying German at Surrey, you will improve your competency in German to prepare you to use the language in professional and academic settings. Parallel to your language training, you will also study the culture, history and society of the German-speaking world. Below are some suggestions and resources to prepare you to study with us.

Post A-Level German

In your first year you will take a **German language** module in both semesters, and a **German culture and society** module in the second semester. You may also take a **German translation** module in semester 1.

For the German language modules, there is an accompanying course book, which will be used regularly throughout the first year, so is the one book you probably will want to purchase. However, we do have copies in the University library.

Ab Initio German

In your first year you will have intensive language classes which aim to bring you up to a similar level to students who already have an A level. You will have six contact hours per week rather than three, in order to give you plenty of opportunities to practise the language and gain confidence.

We will also be using texts from other books and many online materials in German. In the second semester the ab initio language classes will ensure that you have covered the same professional language as the post A level class and will also give language support for the **Understanding Germany** module
