## Agglomeration **Economies** and Productivity

#### DR YOO RI KIM

The researchers used spatial econometric modelling on microeconomic panel data to estimate the effects of agglomeration economies on productivity in the UK tourism sector. They found significant effects of agglomeration economies on productivity within specific regions and significant spatial spillover effects across neighbouring regions, suggesting the possibility of productivity convergence. This research provides insights on the importance of developing business clusters or zones in addressing low productivity levels in the sector across the UK.

## Airbnb and Residents' Wellbeing

### **DR ANYU LIU PROFIIS TUSSYADIAH**

This study found that the positive impacts of the development of peer-topeer accommodation are more pronounced than the negative impacts. Perceived negative social and environmental impacts lessen community residents' wellbeing. This suggests policymakers to enact regulations to reduce damage to the environment and to curtail negative social behaviours brought to the community by visitors, to align peer-topeer accommodation development with the sustainable development goals across different destinations.
