University of Surrey advances to the top 3 in the world on the 2021 Global Ranking of Academic Subjects (GRAS) for Hospitality and Tourism Management, climbing two places from last year's position on the same rankings. 

SHTM: Home to Global Leaders

University of Surrey's School of Hospitality and Tourism Management is ranked **third** in the world and **first** in the UK on the **2021 Global Ranking of Academic Subjects (GRAS)** for Hospitality and Tourism Management, published by ShanghaiRanking Consultancy.

The GRAS rankings represent the most comprehensive and objective ranking of world universities by subjects. The GRAS rankings use a range of objective academic indicators and third-party data to measure the performance of world universities in respective subjects, including research output (Q1), research influence (CNCI), international collaboration (IC), research quality (Top), and international academic awards (Award). This year sees SHTM's remarkable performance in all indicators, particularly in research influence and international collaboration.



How Divided are UK Residents on Vaccine Passports?

The UK moved to Step 3 of the Government's roadmap out of lockdown on 17 May 2021, which included lifting a ban on foreign travel. Yet, travelling to amber and red list countries still carries strict regulations. UK residents can use proof of vaccination or Covid status (via NHS app) to ease travel restrictions, a scheme known as vaccine passports. However, its implementation is still laden with issues and public opinion about it appears polarised.

We conducted **two studies** to explore public opinion about vaccine passports. First, we **mined opinions from Twitter** from December 2020, the start of vaccination rollout, to April 2021 and, using topic modelling, extracted major themes from relevant tweets. 14 major themes were identified. Those supporting vaccine passport argued that it will allow people access to services and to go on holiday, ease international travel, help the economy to recover and society to return to normality. Those rejecting the scheme cited issues of civil liberties, discrimination, privacy, and surveillance.

To further explore the prevalence of these opinions in the UK, **an online survey** was distributed to 1,000 UK residents between 14 and 20 May 2021. When it comes to vaccine passports, people surveyed generally agreed on its benefits. Only about a third agreed that vaccine passports will restrict individual freedom, increase discrimination, and threaten privacy. Half of those surveyed stated they intend to use vaccine passports in general, for travel, and to go to pubs, restaurants, and shops in the near future. Only 20% reported they would be unwilling to use it, with 30% undecided.

These findings on consumer confidence regarding vaccine passports are important for the industry and governments as we carefully plan to ease international travel. As consumers are aware of the benefits of vaccine passports, the most effective way to increase uptake is to address its drawbacks. For institutions providing and requesting proof of vaccination or Covid status for travel, it is paramount that the remaining issues pertaining to privacy and exclusion are addressed.
