

Mentoring Circles

SHTM has introduced the Mentoring Circles scheme to support, influence, and foster the career aspirations of all members of the SHTM team, allow the sharing of excellence and best-practices more widely, and enhance a more supportive and collaborative atmosphere in the School.

Our Research Impact

IMPROVING LABOUR MANAGEMENT PRACTICES IN TOURISM & HOSPITALITY

Prof Allan Williams

Improving productivity unlocks enhanced competitiveness, profits, wages, and consumer benefits, but this has been a persistent challenge in low productivity sectors such as hospitality. Research on labour flexibility, led by Professor Allan Williams, has increased understanding of the determinants of labour productivity in the hospitality sector, leading to productivity-raising human resource management changes in three important arenas: a) the employment practices of 3 hotel groups accounting for 9,000 rooms; b) the consultancy services provided by Eproductive Ltd to 39 client hotel groups; and c) the success of VisitBritain in negotiating and implementing the 2019 Tourism Sector Deal, as part of the Government Industrial Strategy.

SUPPORTING THE EMOTIONAL WELLBEING OF HYPERMOBILE TRAVELLERS

Prof Scott Cohen

Professor Scott Cohen's research on the physiological, psychological, emotional and social consequences of frequent or excessive travel has led to an improvement in the emotional wellbeing of hypermobile travellers. Media coverage of Cohen's research moved the risks of hypermobility up the agenda of employers, who came to view this as a business risk concern. International SOS, the world's largest medical and travel security services firm, used Cohen's research as a basis from which to construct and launch the world's first emotional support service for the mobile workforce. Used by 1,000 organisations, the service provides rapidresponse psychological counselling, and has safeguarded the emotional wellbeing of mobile workers across 96 countries, with take-up of the service doubling year-on-year since its inception.
